It is with great pleasure that we seek your participation in the five-day-long Online International Conference, 2020 on Śāstreşu Śabdavrtti-vicāraḥ, beginning from 25th August, 2020. The conference is being organized by the Department of Sanskrit, Cooch Behar Panchanan Barma University, Cooch Behar, West Bengal, India. We cordially invite you to attend this conference on the abovementioned dates, from 12 to 4 PM every day.

About the University:

Cooch Behar Panchanan Barma University (CBPBU) is a public University in Cooch Behar, West Bengal, India. The Government of West Bengal established it under the West Bengal Act XXI of 2012 and The Cooch Behar Panchanan Barma University Act, 2012. The University is recognized by the University Grants Commission, which functions under the Ministry of Human Resource and Development, Government of India. It was named after the great 19th-century Rajbangshi leader and social reformist, Thakur Panchanan Barma. Fifteen colleges in Cooch Behar district are affiliated to the University.

About the Department of Sanskrit:

The Department of Sanskrit began its journey with the Master of Arts programme in 2015. Presently, it offers two optional specializations of Kāvya and Veda in the same. The number of seats in the Post Graduate programme is 40. The Department constantly strives to achieve a healthy balance between Modern Sanskrit Literature and traditional subjects, in order to make students aware of the holistic approach of Sanskrit literature. Many pupils from the Department have successfully passed the NET-JRF, NET, and WB-SET examinations. The Ph.D. programme was rolled out in 2019. Today, the total number of research scholars in the Department is 26. Since the beginning, the Department has organized many state level seminars, symposiums, and special lectures. However, this is the first time that it is going to organize a five-day-long Online International Conference. Presently, three faculty members serve the Department. They are very energetic about saving the Sanskrit language and promoting its culture globally.

About the Theme:

Sabda helps us in understanding others' feelings. Although feelings can be conveyed through various gestures and postures, words have the power to convey emotions in the best manner. Therefore, without the presence of Sabda, the entire world will become meaningless and horrifying. Dandī Says -

idamandham tamah krtsnam jāyeta bhuvanatrayam/

yadi śabdāhvayam jyotih āsamsāram na dīpyate//

According to Sanskrit Grammarians, Śabda is eternal. All meanings are derived from words. The relation between meanings and words is constant, although the word is eternal. Every word has a power or Śakti to manifest the meaning; otherwise, we could have got the meaning of cloth (Pata) from the word of pot (Ghata). This Power or Śakti is defined in ancient Śāstras as the relation that exists between words and their meanings. As says Viśvanatha in the Siddhāntamuktavalī "Śaktiśca padena saha padārthasya sambandhah". This relation is called 'Śabda-Vṛtti' or the 'Functions of Words'.

Thus, in India, all the schools of thoughts, such as Vaiyākaraṇa, Naiyāyika, Ālaṅkārika, Mīmāṃsaka and Vaidika accept a functional definition of meaning. In general, we find three types of Vṛtti or Function - Abhidhā (Denotation), Lakṣaṇā (Metaphor / Metonymy), and Vyañjanā (Suggestion). Only the school of Ālaṅkārikas accepts all three of them and strongly recommends the understanding of the meanings of various kāvyas. The other schools generally accept only two of them and possess strong opinions about those. Our main focus will be on the varying opinions of those schools about accepting and rejecting the Vṛttis. We will discuss why Vaiyākaraṇas and Naiyāyikas accept only two of them, and why all the three Vṛttis are accepted by Ālaṅkārikas. We shall also consider the views of western philosophical scholars on the subject. We sincerely believe that each eminent and erudite scholar from the different schools mentioned previously will provide us with his/her thoughts and address pertinent questions. We are sure that we will be highly enriched through their lectures.

- Margins: 1 inch (2.5 cm) all sides; Left Justified.
- Line Spacing: 1.5
- Word Limit: For Abstract 500 Words (Max.) and for Full Paper 5000 Words (Max.) including references.
- References in MLA (8th Edition) style, alphabetically sorted.
- Use Endnotes (Do not use Footnotes).
- All graphs, figures, tables should be placed in the text where they are discussed in the paper.

Guidelines for the Authors:

- The paper should be an original and unpublished contribution.
- All the submitted research papers will be reviewed on a double-blinded peer review basis to ensure relevance, quality and originality.
- All rights about the selection of papers are reserved with the Editors.
- Each paper must accompany the undertaking of the author(s) and it should be sent along with the full paper.
- The author's name, designation, official/residential address along with contact no and e-mail-id should appear below the main title of the paper followed by the abstract and then the text respectively.
- The author should strictly observe the UGC norms of plagiarism while preparing the paper.
- No paper will be accepted after the due date.
- The abstract (for presentation) should be attached in the Google Form in the time of registration.
